
OLD DUNUMIANS ASSOCIATION 2015 BULLETIN



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SCHOOL NEWS

The school has enjoyed a number of very fine successes during the last year. It was again a delight to see our pupils achieve great success in their GCSE, AS and A-Level examinations. Rachel Nelson's 5A* grades at A-Level was particularly outstanding as were the 10A* GCSE grades apiece achieved by Sophie Blaney and Lindsay Heenan. The vast majority of students got into their first choice university courses. It is also pleasing to report that three pupils have received conditional offers from Oxbridge colleges for 2015. Our expanded Sixth Form has been a great success, and the introduction of BTEC courses in conjunction with the South Eastern Regional College has allowed many existing and new pupils to access their university courses with a string of excellent results.

The year ended with a fond farewell to our Head of Music and Senior Teacher, Mr Bertie Coffey. Few can have passed through the ranks over the past thirty-one years without having been inspired by Bertie's teaching, led expertly by his conducting or counselled by his wisdom. In short, Bertie represented everything that Down High School is about and we wish him and his wife Ella every happiness for the future.

Sporting success continues to be a hallmark of the school, with pupils representing Ulster and Ireland schools in rugby, girls' golf, equestrian sport, football, table tennis and squash. Our traditional winter sports of hockey and rugby are thriving, with seasons marked by extended cup runs in many age categories. Our girls are again the Northern Ireland football champions and Sarah Connolly in Year 12 is a full NI Women's international, playing soccer alongside women considerably older then her. In tennis, our girls won the Ulster Junior Tennis Plate after a thrilling run in the competition.

In other aspects of school life, a team of chemists (Thomas Johnston, Ben Ford and Rachel Nelson) won the Northern Ireland Chemistry Young Analysts' Competition and were narrowly beaten into second place in the UK final. The school production of "The Wizard of Oz" was a great success and the return of competitive public speaking and the Senior Debating Society as part of our extra-curricular menu will be of interest for many Old Dunumians.

I am also happy to report that Down High is now an Eco-Schools green flag holder, meaning that the "Green High" epithet is well and truly appropriate!

Trips and other educational opportunities saw Down High pupils travelling far and wide; from Paris, Rome and London to Canada, the USA and India the pupils gained so much culturally, socially and educationally. We have had a number of very positive and encouraging meetings regarding the new build and are very hopeful that positive news will be forthcoming over the coming months so that the pupils and staff will soon be accommodated in the state of the art facilities they, and our community, deserve.

In short, the last twelve months have been entirely satisfying and I hope this short account of some of the highlights has allowed you to see that everything is progressing well in your alma mater.

It was with sadness that everyone learned of the closure of the Preparatory Department at Down High School. It will officially close on August 31, 2015. SAPHARA VISIT TO INDIA

On the 10th July 2014 seven students from Down High (George Smyth, Patrick Preston, Conor Maynes, Matthew Lennon, Jenny Robinson, Erin McLoughlin and Emma Telford) had the privilege of travelling to India with the charity Saphara, along with students from Assumption Grammar School and St Patricks Grammar. It's safe to say before we went out we had no idea what to expect, despite our months of preparation and very successful fundraising! The trip exceeded our expectations in every way possible, especially with regard to the teaching and the amazing people that we met.

Our journey began in Belfast and took us through Dublin and Dubai until we finally arrived in the bustling commotion that was Delhi. One thing that immediately stunned us were the Indian streets, which were full of people in packed cars, tuk-tuks and motorbikes swerving between imagined lanes with horns blaring making for guaranteed interesting journeys. After buying our Indian clothes and a day trip to Agra to visit the beautiful Taj Mahal, we took the train to the city of Dehradun and the province of Uttarakhand. After a short taxi journey up the winding mountain roads we arrived at our hotel in Mussoorie to prepare for the teaching we would be doing in our first school.

The first school we were teaching in was Kaplani High School, which had around 80 students of secondary school age. The team was split up into four teaching group, and we taught our classes a variety of different lessons such as Music, PE, Science and Personal Development all of which had a core focus on teaching English. Though all of us were initially nervous going into our first classes despite our lesson preparation and all of the fantastic learning materials we had brought, these nerves were quickly swept away as soon as we got

to start teaching. Despite only being with the kids for a short time everyone made a very strong personal connection with each of their classes, and it was impossible not to. Their desire to learn, enthusiasm and general positivity and bright smiling faces made it a joy to teach them, and our relationships were deepened at lunch time when the girls would teach us dancing and the boys would play cricket. Lunch time in Kaplani also gave us the opportunity to see the midday meals that are funded and supplied by Saphara, and seeing the pupils tucking in to a massive plate of what might be their only hot meal of the day was a real privilege. After a fantastic four days of teaching, we had to say a fond farewell to Kaplani but not before we gave some small gifts to every child in the school and had a cultural exchange, which apart from traditional Indian dancing and a vibrant rendition of "In The Jungle" featured the debut performance of the 'KapSaph Choir'. After some emotional goodbyes, we stayed for a few more days in Mussoorie as part of our Global Awareness weekend. This involved arduous trekking to the remote primary school Donk to teach adorable children in a school fully supported by Saphara, as well as talking to the inspirational Surrender Singh, co-ordinator of the NGO MGVS who Saphara work closely with, along with some exploration of the town of Mussoorie with its amazing mountain views.

We then made the descent back into Dehradun where we would spend the next week teaching in SNEHA School, which not even Kaplani could have prepared us for! The hustle and bustle of the city was a stark contrast to the relative calm of the mountains, and the classrooms we taught in were similarly a lot livelier! We were primarily teaching kids from P1-P3 age, with classes being more than twice as large as those in Kaplani which brought with it a whole range of new challenges for us to face in our teaching. Despite the SNEHA classes being more rowdy and a bit cheekier, the children were equally great to teach and their energy and enthusiasm inspired us to put even more work into our planning and our teaching in the classroom, as we taught our classes about animals, telling the time, food and their daily routine as we tried to make our lessons as interactive and educational as we could.

In the afternoons, we also got the opportunity to take conversation classes with some of the older students in the school who were around our own age, and this was a great opportunity to help them sharpen their conversational skills, as well as make new friends and discover new things about each other's cultures. This often involved swapping dance moves as we learned traditional Indian dances and taught our students the Macarena! Saphara and SNEHA had run a course teaching young women from the community how to do henna tattoos, and during one of our conversation classes we had the privilege of getting a beautiful tattoo, with the girls getting incredibly intricate designs on their hands and the boys getting their names in Hindi on their forearms.

When we were at SNEHA, we also got the opportunity to visit the marginalised community (or slum) where a lot of the children who we taught come from, and seeing the poverty which these happy, bright children live in was hard to take in. We got to talk to Dr Rita Rao who founded and runs SNEHA School, and her example and dedication to the children and the school was really amazing. Hearing her story about the school's humble beginnings and seeing where it had come to now, was incredibly inspiring. Another inspirational character who we met at SNHEA was the English teacher Nadesh, whose passion for his subject and his students as well as his humour made him a real role model for all of us in our teaching.

After a late night return train journey to Delhi, we spent our final day in India visiting the stunning Lotus Temple and doing some shopping in the Cottage Emporium, where we were able to buy a whole host of Indian treasures as presents for people back home. We returned to Belfast and said our goodbyes to each other and to our Indian adventure, as it all felt like it was over too soon. We came back as changed people, with strong friendships formed and memories that will last a lifetime, but most importantly the mark the children left on our lives and the mark we left on theirs. Our team would like to thank all who supported us, whether through helping to organise fundraising, donating or any small contribution to our cause, as it was all so infinitely worth it.

SPEAKERS' EVENING

Professor Rosalind Smyth gave an extremely interesting talk on Thursday 27 May 2014.

Rosalind attended Down High School from 1970 – 1977. She graduated in medicine from Clare College, Cambridge and University of London and also trained in paediatrics in London, Cambridge and Liverpool.

Until September 2012, she was Professor of Paediatric Medicine at the University of Liverpool and Honorary Consultant Paediatrician at Alder Hey Children's NHS Foundation Trust. She was Director of the NIHR Medicines for Children Research Network, which supports all clinical research with children in England and as Executive Director she led the establishment of Liverpool Health Partners.

Currently she is Director of The Institute of Child Health at University College London and Honorary Consultant Respiratory Paediatrician at Great Ormond Street Hospital. Until December 2013 she was a member of the Commission on Human Medicine and chair of its Paediatric Expert Advisory Group. She is a Fellow and recent Council member of the Academy of Medical Sciences (UK). She is a panel member for the Research Excellence Framework, which is currently assessing the quality of research in UK universities.

Her current research interests include clinical studies of viral/host interactions in RSV bronchiolitis, clinical trials and systematic reviews of treatments for childhood respiratory disease.

Professor Smyth was the Guest of Honour at the School Prize Day held on Friday 24 October 2014.

Rosalind has since been awarded a CBE in the Queen's New Year Honours in recognition of her services to drug regulation for children. Following the award, the Professor said she was pleased to have played a "small part" in the huge progress made in the development of safe new medicines for children over the past decade.
